## The Milk (Mainly I Love Kids) Fund

- He was 3 years old but had the developmental skills of only an 18-month old baby. He was frail and underweight. He had spent half his life in a plywood box 4 by 3 feet until he was found by social workers. After his parents' divorce, Dan (not his real name) was in the sole care of his maternal grandmother who found it too difficult to keep up with her young charge. So, she confined him to a box. Today, he is 6 years old, and is a cheerful and sociable boy ready for Primary 1 next year – thanks to the timely intervention of social workers from the Healthy Start programme who put him in a childcare programme and taught his family child management skills.
- She had just turned 17 years old but was carrying a child within her. Many would argue that she was still a child herself; how ready could she be to bring up another child? Afraid of all the objections, Rosie (not her real name) kept her pregnancy a secret. Isolated and with no guidance and resources, she was clueless about the life-threatening condition she was in. Fortunately for her, she heard about the Babes SMS hotline to help teenagers in pregnancy crisis. She plucked up courage to call for help. The social worker brought her immediately to the doctor. Not only did she discover that she was 7 months pregnant, and not 5 months as she had thought, she also learnt she had preeclampsia that was leading to renal failure. Both the lives of the teen mother and the baby within her were in danger. Thankfully to timely intervention, because she could reach for help through the Babes programme, both mother and child are alive and doing well today.

hildren are the faces of our future: faces full of hope, life and promise. MILK (Mainly I Love Kids) is about giving disadvantaged or troubled children something to smile about.
